The kids were so excited, when it came time for kindergarten graduation. There was an alphabet poem, and everybody was getting a letter. Everybody had their hands in the air, competing for the next one. This kid wanted "L," for his first name, but some other kid beat him to it. If he'd been a little sharper back in 1976, he'd have waited for "S," for his last name, but he kept his hand up and got "N." And so at graduation, he recited the poem: "N is for news truck/ with papers piled high/ that tell stories of kings/ and saucers that fly."

Of course he went on to become a newspaperman.

Lawrence Specker grew up in northwest Alabama. But he had relatives in Mobile, and most years his grandparents would go visit them and bring back a box of Mardi Gras throws. Mystics of Time stuff. Father Time. Dragons. Doubloons that rang like no other coin. Based on the available evidence, Mobile seemed like a pretty exotic place.

Of course he went on to Mobile.

He discovered music piecemeal, which is a pretty good way to discover it. Ennio Morricone movie music, unlike anything else on the family turntable. Late-night DJs on a tube radio turned down low, playing crazy story-songs like Brownsville Station's "The Martian Boogie," Hoyt Axton's "Della & the Dealer," Johnny Cash's "One Piece at a Time." Charlie Daniels country, Casey Kasem pop, then hard rock, then classical and blues, then jazz. There's a pattern there. If you like strong stuff and weird stuff and free stuff, eventually you're going to find jazz, which can be stronger and weirder and freer that just about anything.

Lawrence got a job at the Mobile Press-Register in 1994 and in 2001 fell into a situation so fortuitous that even Forrest Gump would be jealous: He got to be the paper's entertainment reporter. The rest is history. The first draft of history, anyway. The job consisted in large part of discovering how rich Mobile was, musically, and encouraging people to just listen for themselves and share the wealth.

It has been a learning experience. It has been fun. It has been humbling. It has been uplifting, because it has been a chance to talk to hundreds of creative people excited about what they're doing.

If that kindergarten poem holds true, eventually there'll be a flying saucer ride. But until then we've got music, and music will do.
